Request for Information (RFI)

Local Food Purchasing Assistance Cooperative Agreement Program (LFPA)

1. Request for Information Overview

The Office of the Deputy Mayor for Planning and Economic Development (DMPED), in collaboration with the Office of Planning (OP), is requesting input from organizations in the District that work with socially disadvantaged farmers/producers and distribute fresh and nutritious food to underserved communities (those that face, or at higher risk of, food insecurity) in the District, either directly or through a partner organization, on the design and approach to a new program to increase food access, strengthen the local economy, and establish partnerships with food producers. The program is anticipated to be implemented within the next year.

2. Background and Context

Throughout the COVID-19 public health emergency, the District has increased program offerings and investments within the food system to ensure that residents are supported in meeting their food and nutritional needs. As part of the FY 2022 budget, Mayor Bowser committed \$58 million to the Food Access Fund to provide capital investments to increase equitable access to fresh, healthy, and affordable food by closing the grocery gap and strengthening grocery access programs. As part of that investment, \$4 million will be invested in the Nourish DC Collaborative, which supports small food businesses through grants, loans, and technical assistance. Additionally, the District delivered nearly 12,000 grocery boxes to residents quarantined at home due to COVID-19, and distributed over 1,000,000 pounds of free, fresh produce and groceries to residents throughout 2020 and 2021.

Despite these efforts, and the waning of COVID-19, District residents in underserved communities continue to face elevated needs and face higher rates of food insecurity. Though the overall rate of food insecurity in the District has returned to near pre-COVID levels (11% in 2021 compared to 10.6% in 2019), Black and Latinx households, households with children, and seniors continue to face elevated levels of food insecurity when compared to the general District population. These higher rates of food insecurity reflect the systemic challenges of the racial wealth gap and historic disinvestments in communities of color which require continued strategic investment and support. In December 2021, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) released a funding opportunity for State and Tribal Governments for the Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement Program (LFPA). The LFPA is a non-competitive grant which is has been authorized under Section 1001(b)(4) of the American Rescue Plan Act (P.L. 117-2). The District has been authorized to receive up to \$1.1 million, however, only one award will be made per State government.

The LFPA program is a part of the Build Back Better initiative with the purpose of improving food and agricultural supply chain resiliency. This will be achieved through the support of local, regional, and socially disadvantaged farmers and producers. The cooperative agreement allows the District to procure healthy, nutritious foods and beverages to meet the needs of its residents. This can be through utilizing the food procurements for food and nutrition programs, food banks, schools, and community-based organizations that directly support underserved communities and communities of color. In addition to supporting these communities, the purchases are strategic

investments that will create growth and new economic opportunities for socially disadvantaged farmers and producers.

3. RFI and Project Objectives

Through this RFI, DMPED and OP seek information from organizations that work with socially disadvantaged farmers/producers and/or provide support for underserved communities, to formulate an impactful intervention for the LFPA grant application to:

- Strengthen it's the District's local and regional food system;
- Help to support local, regional, and socially disadvantaged farmers/producers through building and expanding economic opportunities; and

• Establish and broaden partnerships between farmers/producers and the food distribution community (District government institutions, community-based food organizations, farmers' markets, etc.), to ensure distribution of fresh and nutritious foods in underserved communities.

The District intends to use the information gathered from this RFI to apply for the funding opportunity through the USDA AMS in the amount of \$1.1 million. The District may select an organization from the respondents to this solicitation to partner/contract with for its grant application. By responding to this solicitation you acknowledge that your organization, should its program proposal be accepted, intends to work with the District to complete the LFPA grant application and will be the District's prime contractor for the period of performance.
